

Guaro is exceptionally attractive to all the five senses, without being excessive to any yet combining an enchanting mixture of smells and colours. The almond groves are responsible for the timeless spectacle, that happens each spring, when the trees bloom and cover the surrounding fields with white and pink blankets of flowers and the intense perfume unique to this flower warns the distracted visitor that he or she is getting close to Guaro. There are places and rivers of great environmental interest together with some very emblematic examples of animals and vegetation that make visitors desire to linger as long as possible before abandoning the valley.

Guaro is traditionally a crossroads situated at the foot of a mountain range that, in turn, connects it to the life-giving Sierra de las Nieves, which is located close by and which has been awarded the distinguished title of Biosphere Reserve by the UNESCO. This itself makes it different from almost all the other surrounding municipalities. It is a spot where the first men who came across it as nomads decided to stay and settle down given its beauty and possibilities. Men have since carefully worked the agricultural land and developed the urban section in deep respect for the environment and the surrounding area, and it is today a true example of sustainable development.

# THE OLD QUARTER

This walk takes the visitor to the San Isidro (the patron saint of the village) Fountain, which is located in front of one of the most beautiful corners of the village, and in turn is covered by a lovely cloak of flowers and green plants finished off with a ceramic mosaic and well looked after by the inhabitants of Guaro.

The walk follows on to the next stop, which is at the San Miguel Arcángel Church, dating back to the XVI century and restored in 1605. It was almost totally rebuilt after the Civil War in a Latin Cross form with side naves.

The final leg of this stroll is through the narrow village streets which offer the visitor a chance to get an idea as to what life is really like in these Andalusian villages, with their people, harmony, and spontaneous songs coming from the windows along with the accompanying smells of all kinds of delicious potato stews.

The walk ends at the same place as it set off.

# THE SANCTUARY THE CROSS OF THE PORT

Most of this walk takes place in la Cañada Real de Guaro a Rio Grande (the ravine of the Rio Grande in Guaro). Between working count ryside and whitewashed houses, you can isit the Cementerio del pueblo (the village Cemetery), natural viewpoints and the Santuario de la Cruz del Puerto, which was built at the cross roads for the Guareños (people of Guaro) when they left Guaro to work abroad.

This little 18th century hermi tage houses an image of Cristo de Limpias, with flowers and surrounded by cypress trees offering the visitor a spectacular panoramic view of the country side of Guaro, la Sierra de las Nieves, la Vega del rio Grande and el Valle del Guadalhorce.

Every 3rd of May, they celebrate día de la Cruz (day of the Cross) with a procession from the Church of San Miguel to la Ermita (the Hermitage) carrying a cross of flowers.

# THE VIEWPOINTS

This walk takes the visitor outside the urban limits of the village along the road to Marbella towards a spot famous for its special vantage points on the higher side of Guaro. These Miradores (viewpoints) with their flowers and trees make these already beautiful surroundings even more impressive.

Each one has a different size and shape and harmoniously combines old stone and brick. The panoramic views of the fields around Guaro include the Mediterranean style field with its olive trees and almonds, against the background of the bleached-white houses which are covered in the original ceramic Arabic roof tiles.

The end is once again the starting point, all the time enjoying the wonderful views.

# THE MOORISH MOON

This walk takes the visitor through the narrow streets which were common in Arab days and so typical of these villages today. The reason that they were so narrow was to keep the suns rays and, therefore, the blazing heat out and also to provide a clear passageway for the breezes that would be able to rundown them and cool down even the hottest of summer days. Steep streets that make many of the throne-carrying men sweat in Easter week. Lined with flower potted white-washed walls with barred windows these same streets take the visitor on to the Olive Oil Museum, home to the Fiesta de la Luna Mora (The Fiesta in Honour of The Moorish Moon), which is a cultural and social highlight in Guaro's calendar

Once lost amongst the windy labyrinth-like streets, the visitor will come across Tower Street, so called after the Watchtower of Guaro that once stood high there during the important bygone days and before it was almost completely destroyed during the Reconquista.

Finally this walk ends at the San Miguel Arcángel Parish Church, which is the central place full of beliefs, faith, prayers and wax from the hundreds of candles during the Easter Week celebrations.
